Occupational Therapy - Improving Lives, Saving Money campaign, latest report titled "*Relieving the pressure on social care; the value of occupational therapy*" published at the end of August:

The report outlines the integral role that occupational therapists play in the social care system. The report shows how the work of occupational therapists can relieve the pressure on the social care system and highlights that despite making up just 4% of the regulated workforce, occupational therapists address 35 – 45% of local authority referrals.

The report demonstrates that occupational therapists take a holistic approach to providing social care. They look at not only the person but their occupations and their environment, whether it is within their home or related to accessing their community or work.

The report makes recommendations for how occupational therapists can be most effectively used to enhance the life opportunities for people with learning disabilities. As experts in occupations and participation, as well as mental and physical health, occupational therapists are ideally placed to provide a leading role in the delivery of multi-disciplinary learning disability services.

The report was launched at the Annual Conference. The report is available on the ILSM pages of the RCOT site and publication will be supported by communications to our members and the media as well as targeted letters to stakeholders.
